



South Slave Artwork Installation Complete at Hay River Regional Health Centre

HAY RIVER (April 26, 2022) – The Hay River Health and Social Services Authority (HRHSSA) is excited to inform the community that an artwork installation at the Hay River Regional Health Centre promoting Northwest Territories (NWT) artists is now complete. The exhibit showcases 28 traditional arts and fine crafts from artists across the South Slave Region including Hay River, Fort Providence, Fort Resolution, K’atl’odeeche First Nation, Enterprise, Fort Smith and Kakisa. In addition to these regional pieces, one painting was created by a Behchoko artist and donated to HRHSSA, specifically for the midwifery program.

This long-awaited project was first imagined in March 2021 when HRHSSA began a partnership with the NWT Arts Program, Department of Industry, Tourism, and Investment (ITI) South Slave Regional Office to incorporate artwork of regional artists into the Hay River Regional Health Centre. After a year of many challenges and roadblocks connected to COVID-19, the display is complete and encompasses a sense of culture to the walls and common areas of the Centre.

Patients and visitors of the Hay River Regional Health Centre are encouraged to view these displays and join us in recognizing and celebrating the talent and culture of the communities we serve.
