



Call for Artists - Nuuk Nordic Culture Festival

Nuuk, Greenland

Accepting applications until August 20, 2019

The Inuit Art Foundation invites Inuit jewellers from across Canada to submit applications to take part in a cultural exchange as part of the IAF's Circumpolar Exchange Program, funded by the Canada Council for the Arts. In partnership with the Nuuk Art Museum, the IAF will send one artist to exhibit their work and participate in the Nuuk Nordic Culture Festival from October 7-13, 2019. The selected artist will have the chance to meet artists from across the circumpolar North during the festival, as well as have their work included in an exhibition at the Nuuk Art Museum from October to December.

The artist must be available from September 30 to October 14, 2019 to travel to Nuuk, Greenland for the festival, with all associated costs covered by the Inuit Art Foundation and Nuuk Art Museum.

An artist honorarium of \$1,500 will be offered.
